Field of gold

26 champs on '06 Wrangler NFR roster

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Twenty-six world champions with a combined 82 world titles highlight the 118-member field of the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo, Nov. 30-Dec. 9 at the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas.



Three-time world champion all-around cowboy Trevor Brazile of Decatur, Texas, heads the list and will wear the No. 1 back number, competing in both team roping (heading) and tie-down roping for the third time at the Wrangler NFR (2003-04, 2006). He is trying to become the just the fifth cowboy to win four world all-around crowns and would trail only Ty Murray (7), Tom Ferguson and Larry Mahan (6) and Jim Shoulders (5) in the record books.

Brazile is one of only two two-event cowboys at the 2006 Wrangler NFR - eight-time world champion Joe Beaver of Huntsville,

Texas, is the other and trails Brazile in the all-around race by nearly \$135,000. However, Brazile's quest to return to the winner's circle is far from the only compelling story for which to watch in Las Vegas:

- ✓ Reigning world champion bareback rider Will Lowe of Canyon, Texas, takes a \$27,000 lead into the Wrangler NFR and is trying to become the first bareback rider to defend his title since ProRodeo Hall of Fame member Marvin Garrett in 1994-95.
- ✓ Eight-time world champion team roper Speed Williams of De Leon, Texas, and seven-time champion Clay O'Brien Cooper of Morgan Mill, Texas, joined forces this year and enter the Wrangler NFR in fourth and third place, respectively, in the regular-season standings. The team already has captured victories at the prestigious Pace Picante ProRodeo Chute-out in Tulsa, Okla., in May and the Wrangler ProRodeo Tour Championship, presented by

PRCA awards regular-season champions

Dent wins all-around, bareback rookie honors

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – It was Steven Dent's goal to win at least one Resistol Rookie of the Year award. He actually snatched two of those awards, and he hopes they'll be stepping stones to many more successful seasons.

The Mullen, Neb., cowboy ran away with the all-around rookie of the year title, totaling \$42,598. His closest competition was nearly \$25,000 behind.

Dent also won the bareback riding rookie award, finishing the season with \$31,969 in that event alone. In sad-

Whitaker wins record fifth Linderman Award

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – Last year, Kyle Whitaker made a little bit of history when he won the PRCA's Linderman Award for the fourth time, tying his father, Chip, and Phil Lyne for the most number of awards won.

This year, Whitaker is in a category all his own. He won a record fifth Linderman Award, which is given to a cowboy who competes in both timed and roughstock events and wins at least \$1,000 in three different events.

It's an accomplishment he's quite proud of.

- ▶ **Slippery, saddle bronc of year, dies.** Korkow Rodeos' Slippery, the 2006 PRCA Saddle Bronc Horse of the Year and most outstanding saddle bronc horse of the 2005 Wrangler National Finals Rodeo, died Nov. 15.

Slippery spent the last three weeks at a Veterinary Hospital after being spotted in distress on the family ranch 20 miles east of Pierre, S.D. Dr. Ismay and Dr. Dickenson of the Sturgis Vet Hospital did a series of test involving samples of blood, urine, spinal fluid and tissue and were unable to come up with a diagnosis. Several treatments and different medications were used to no avail and as his condition worsened the family decided to end his life rather than let him suffer.

Slippery was returned to the Korkow Ranch, where he was buried on a hill beside Korkow's foundation stallion, 323 Confused Velvet, and several other equine stars.

The bay gelding was born in the spring of 1999 and started his bucking career when he was 3 years old. He was voted the top Bareback Horse of the 2005 Dodge National Circuit Finals before being switched to the saddle bronc riding. He went on to be voted the Best Bronc of the Badlands Circuit in 2005 as well as the Bronc of the Finals at the 2005 Wrangler NFR. Earlier this year, he was voted the Top Saddle Bronc of the 2006 DNCFR in Pocatello, Idaho, and was again named the 2006 Saddle Bronc of the Year in the Badlands Circuit.

His last competition was the ProRodeo Tour Summer Finale in Omaha, Neb., the end of September, where Bobby Griswold rode him for 80 points and a second place finish in the final round.

- ▶ **Legends Breakfast winners, TV package.** The inaugural Legends of ProRodeo Breakfast, a PRCA-sanctioned event, has selected its honorees for this year. ProRodeo Hall of Fame team roper Jake Barnes will receive the Legends of ProRodeo Award for displaying outstanding leadership in the home, arena and community. Three-time world champion team roper Allen Bach has been selected for a special award to honor dedicated leadership in serving youth as a mentor and positive role model.

The event, which will be presented by the PRCA and Athletes in Action, will take place at the South Point Hotel and Casino in Las Vegas at 10 a.m. on Dec. 1 during the Wrangler NFR. Guests at the event, which will be emceed by Wrangler NFR announcers Bob Tallman and Boyd Polhamus, will hear messages from rodeo legends about their successes, challenges, families and faith.

Tonozzi, Johnson earn spot in 2007 DNCFR with Mountain States Circuit win

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. - Team ropers Garrett Tonozzi and Jhett Johnson used the Dodge Mountain States Circuit Finals, presented by U.S. Smokeless Tobacco Co., to not only earn a spot in the 2007 Dodge National Circuit Finals, but as a tune-up for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo.

Tonozzi, of Fruita, Colo., and Johnson, of Casper, Wyo., will both be making their first appearance at the Wrangler NFR at the end of the month but they will not be competing as a team in Las Vegas. However, they used the team chemistry to their advantage in Denver during the weekend to win the average title with a three-head total of 17.9 seconds.

The duo finished second in the first round with a time of 6.1 seconds and won the second round in a time of 5.7. They outdistanced the team of Miles Kobold and Doug Cox, who finished with an 18.4, for the average title. The year-end circuit winners in the team roping, who also earned a spot in the 2007 DNCFR, were C.J. Scheller of Ault, Colo., and Lance Allen of Burns, Wyo.

dle bronc riding, Dent finished seventh. Tyler Corrington of Hastings, Minn., won the saddle bronc riding rookie of the year award, easily leading his category.

For Dent, a sophomore at Ranger (Texas) College, competing in rodeo was a tough decision to make, but one he's ultimately glad he chose. In high school, Dent was also a standout football player, track competitor and wrestler. He said he'd narrowed his collegiate sport choice to football or rodeo, and rodeo eventually won out.

"I decided the chance of me making a living in the PRCA is better than me making a living in the NFL," Dent said.

And Dent's coach, PRCA Board

member Tom Reeves, agrees Dent has an excellent chance to do well in the PRCA ranks.

"He's the real deal," Reeves said. "In my opinion, he'll win the world (some day). In bareback, in saddle bronc, in all-around ... he'll win it all."

The other top PRCA rookies were Daniel Yates of Red Lodge, Mont., steer wrestling; Keven Daniel of Altha, Fla., team roping (heading); Jade Corkill of Fallon, Nev., team roping (heeling); Cody James of Monticello, Ark., tie-down roping; Tyler Mayse of Ponca City, Okla., steer roping; and Edgard Oliveira of Denton, Texas, bull riding.

Other year-end champions were Heath Ford, Greeley, Colo., bareback riding; Ken Lewis, La Junta, Colo., steer wrestling; Trevor Thiel, Greeley, Colo., tie-down roping; Brandie Halls, barrel racing, and Cameron Castleberry, Gillette, Wyo., bull riding.

Parsons win year-end, average titles at Turquoise Circuit Finals

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. - It was a family affair in the tie-down roping at the Dodge Turquoise Circuit Finals, presented by U.S. Smokeless Tobacco Co., during the weekend in its new location in Las Cruces, N.M.

It was the Parsons family from Marana, Ariz., winning year-end title and average titles. Joe, 50, won the three-head average with a total time of 31.0 seconds, edging out his son Joseph, who finished with a time of 31.7. However, Joseph captured the year-end title for the Turquoise Circuit and both will make the trek in March to Pocatello to compete in the Dodge National Circuit Finals.

Joining them in the winners circle was 2000 World Champion Bull Rider Cody Hancock. Hancock, of Taylor, Ariz., was only one of two bull riders to post two qualified rides during the weekend. Hancock won the average with 160 points on two to edge Larry Leist, who finished with 144. Leist, of Quemado, N.M., will join Hancock at the DNCFR after winning the year-end title for the Turquoise

Circuit.

Steve Dollarhide captured the average title with a three-head total of 234 points. Dollarhide, of Wikieup, Ariz., placed in all three rounds winning the second round with a 78-point ride on Honeycutt Rodeo's Chinook. Everett Ashurst of Douglas, Ariz., won the year-end title to earn a spot in the DNCFR in Pocatello, Idaho.

Other average champions were Stetson Herrera, Portales, N.M., bareback riding; C.J. Aragon, Belen, N.M., steer wrestling; Russ Sullivan, Peralta, N.M./Levi Garcia, Roy, N.M., team roping; and Sabrina Ketcham, Yeso, N.M., barrel racing.

Other year-end winners were Tom McFarland, Wickenburg, Ariz., bareback riding; Damian Padilla, Rio Rico, Ariz., steer wrestling; Matt Sherwood, Queen Creek, Ariz./Aaron Tsinigine, Winslow, Ariz., team roping; and Sheri Sinor Estrada, Alamogordo, N.M., barrel racing.

Mote goes three-for-three at Columbia River Circuit Finals

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. - Bobby Mote swept the bareback riding competition at the Dodge Columbia River Circuit Finals Rodeo, presented by U.S. Smokeless Tobacco Co., this weekend in Redmond, Ore.

Mote, of Culver, Ore., won all three rounds en route to the average title and the year-end circuit title. The 2002 world champion rode Big Bend Rodeo's Spy for 83 points to win the first round. He returned the second night to post a rodeo-best 88-point ride on Big Bend Rodeo's Spring Fling and finished out the three-day competition with an 83 on Beard Rodeo's Homespun to win the third round. He finished with 254 points on three to outdistance his traveling partner Jason Havens, who finished with 235 points on three, for the average and year-end title.

Bull rider Ned Cross of Roosevelt, Wash., captured the average title during the weekend in Redmond, posting three scores for a total of 259 points. Cross, like Mote, used three round wins to finish atop the average leaderboard with 259 points. Cross won the first round with an 87-point ride on Flying Five Rodeo's Watch Dog. In the second round, he posted a rodeo-best 88-point ride on Big Bend Rodeo's Firebird. In the third and final round he

scored 84 points on Beard Rodeo's King of Queens. Marcus Michaelis finished second to Cross in the average with 228 points on three head.

Zeb Lanham of Sweet, Idaho, won the year-end title in the Columbia River Circuit to earn a trip to the 2007 Dodge National Circuit Finals Rodeo in Pocatello, Idaho.

Barrel racer Brenda Mays captured the average and year-end titles in the Columbia River Circuit during the weekend. Mays, of Terrebonne, Ore., won the average with a three-run total of 47.65 seconds, after finishing first in all three rounds. Mays turned in times of 15.66, 15.98 and 16.01 seconds en route to the title.

Other average winners were Tony Currin, Dayton, Wash., steer wrestling; Shane Erickson, Terrebonne, Ore./Rick Copher, Molalla, Ore., team roping; Shawn Morehead, Bruneau, Idaho, saddle bronc riding; and Tyson Durfey, Colbert, Wash., tie-down roping.

Other year-end winners were Shawn Greenfield, Lakeview, Ore., steer wrestling; Matt Funk, Hermiston, Ore./Bucky Campbell, Benton City, Wash., team roping; Ryan MacKenzie, Jordan Valley, Ore.; and Seth Hopper, Stanfield, Ore., tie-down roping.

Interstate Batteries Texas Stampede, last weekend. Williams holds the PRCA record for team roping titles along with his former partner, Rich Skelton of Llano, Texas, who is roping with Brazile in Las Vegas.

- ✓ Six-time world champion saddle bronc rider Dan Mortensen of Billings, Mont., can stand alone in the PRCA record books with another title that would break the tie with the legendary Casey Tibbs. Mortensen enters the Wrangler NFR in third place, \$19,000 behind regular-season leader Cody DeMoss of Heflin, La.
- ✓ Cody Ohl of Hico, Texas, a five-time world champion with four gold buckles in tie-down roping, finished the regular season with a record \$165,460 and enters the Wrangler NFR with a lead of nearly

\$42,000. Also in the hunt for a world title is ProRodeo Hall of Famer Fred Whitfield of Hockley, Texas, who with seven world champion buckles is just one shy of tying Dean Oliver for the most ever in the event.

- ✓ Steer wrestling has the longest drought between repeat champions since another ProRodeo Hall of Famer, Ote Berry, turned the trick in 1990-91. Defending champion Lee Graves of Calgary, Alberta, ended the regular season in sixth place, some \$36,000 behind leader Dean Gorsuch of Gering, Neb. Graves entered the 2005 Wrangler NFR in fifth place before rallying in the Thomas & Mack Center in Las Vegas to take the title after earning a Wrangler NFR-record \$126,412 during the 10-day event.

"It's pretty hard to imagine that I could win it more than my Dad," Whitaker said. "Growing up, I always looked up to him for winning that many times."

Often hard to even qualify for, the Linderman Award is tough to come by. Whitaker is evidence of that fact, as he was the only cowboy to qualify this season. He had a total of \$36,523 in earnings, making money in saddle bronc riding, tie-down roping and steer wrestling.

Most of Whitaker's earnings, \$23,868, came in steer wrestling, the event he seems to find most of his successes in.

The Linderman Award is named for Bill Linderman, a world champion in timed and riding events who died in a 1965 plane crash in Salt Lake City. The first Linderman Award was presented in 1966.
